ABOUT THE QUILT

This quilt was inspired by shadows on a bookcase. Tina designed this with simplicity and the ability to showcase large swaths of prints or custom quilting in mind.

By using basic components, gentle curves, and inset circles, achieve a modern aesthetic with just a few seams. Skills you will learn to use are glue basting and sewing curves.

MATERIALS

Fabric A (Mist) 1/2 yard

Fabric B (Spray) ½ yard

Fabric C (Washed Black) 1/2 yard

Fabric D (Steel) ½ yard

Fabric E (Lavender) ½ yard

Background Fabric (Amelia Lavender) 2 ¼ yards

Backing: 4 yards

Binding: 5% yard

Batting: 68" x 68"

Materials used include Moda Bella Solids in:

Mist

Lavender

Washed Black

Amelia Lavender

Steel

Outer Space

Spray

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

- Read through all instructions before beginning.
- · All seam allowances are 1/4".
- · Width of fabric (WOF) is assumed to be 40" of usable fabric.
- · Length of fabric = LOF.
- · A coloring diagram is included.
- · Press seams open unless otherwise instructed.
- RST = Right Sides Together
- To prepare templates, print (at actual size, no scaling or 100% scaling)
 and measure 1" test square to confirm size. Cut out template pieces
 along the outer border. Templates include a 1/4" seam allowance.
- Suggested materials are basting glue and a 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " square ruler.

CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS

From Fabric A. cut:

· (3) 121/2" x 121/2" squares

From Fabric B, cut:

• (1) 12½" x 12½" square

From Fabric C, cut:

- · (2) 121/2" x 121/2" squares
- · (1) 14" x 14" square

From Fabric D, cut:

(2) 12½" x 12½" squares

From Fabric E. cut:

· (3) 12½" x 12½" squares

From Background Fabric, cut:


Cut WOF strip first.

- (1) 14" x WOF strip; subcut:
 - -(1) 14" square
 - -(6) $12\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{4}$ " rectangles

With remaining fabric; cut LOF strips.

- (1) 8½" x LOF strip; subcut:
 -(1) 8½" x 60" rectangle
- (1) 6¾" x LOF strip; subcut:
 -(1) 6¾" x 60" rectangle
- (1) $6\frac{1}{2}$ " x LOF strip; subcut: -(1) $6\frac{1}{2}$ " x 60" rectangle
- (1) 3½" x LOF strip; subcut:
 -(1) 3½" x 60" rectangle
- (1) 12½" x LOF strip; subcut:
 -(9) 12½" x 2" rectangles
 -(22) Template A Pieces

PIECING INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Using Template B, mark the corners, middle, and edges of templates and cut curve on a Fabric A Dot.
- 2. Attach Template Piece A of background piece matching the center markings. Using basting glue (or pins) basting to each side. It may be just short of the edge mark on your square, that's okay. Sew on the background fabric using a scant ½" seam allowance.
- 3. Press the background piece away from the square. Trim the square ensuring the $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam remains at the four points of the background fabric (Figure 1).



- 4. Repeat for the 10 remaining dots.
- 5. Press the remaining Fabric C 14" square in half, and then half again.
 Align Circle Middle Template and cut. Mark all four folds with a marking pencil of your choosing, chalk or water soluble, for later basting (Figure 2).



PIECING INSTRUCTIONS

6. Press Background 14" square in half and half again. Align Circle Background Template and cut. Mark all four folds (Figure 3).




- 7. With right sides together start with glue basting one of the markings to a marking of the circle. Keep gluing around the circle matching markings in the quadrants. Glue baste until entire circle is attached being careful not to stretch or pull on the background as it is cut on the bias (Figure 4). If you would like to use pins instead, start by pinning all four markings and then pinning between.
- 8. Sew slowly ¼" seam allowance around the circle, back stitching at the end. Press circle outward toward the background. Use steam to soften any creases.

9. Align your 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " ruler and trim the square, leaving $\frac{1}{4}$ " around each of the four points you previously marked, as shown in Figure 5.






FINAL TOP CONSTRUCTION

1. Line up your blocks in the order indicated in Figure 6. Attach $12\frac{1}{2}$ " sashing to the blocks as indicated. Press seams as desired.

- 2. Attach remaining sashing to the Assembled Blocks. Sew with blocks on top to ensure hitting the curved edge of the seam. Press away from the block row.
- 3. Complete all sashing this way (Figure 7).








FINISHING INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Divide the backing into 68" x WOF lengths. Trim selvages and sew pieces together along the long edge to create a 68" x 83" backing. Trim to 68" x 68".
- 2. Layer backing, batting, and quilt top; baste. Quilt as desired.
- 3. Sew (7) $2\frac{1}{2}$ -wide binding strips into one continuous piece for straight-grain French-fold binding. Bind the quilt.
